Content taught in the course	Government provides an introduction to the Constitution and its structure, an overview of the branches and functions of national and state government, and a robust exploration of federalism. The course also provides a review of the political process and elections. Students will examine the American Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States of America, the State of Illinois.	AP U.S. Government and Politics provides a college-level, non-partisan introduction to key political concepts, ideas, institutions, policies, interactions, roles, and behaviors that characterize the constitutional system and political culture of the United States.  Students will study U.S. foundational documents, Supreme Court decisions, as well as primary and secondary texts to gain an understanding of the relationships and interactions among political institutions, processes, and behaviors. Students will also read and interpret data, make comparisons, and develop evidence-based arguments to defend a position. Students will examine the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States, the State of Illinois.  Students who enroll in this course will be prepared to take the AP United States Government and Politics exam in May.
